The doctor prescribed six weeks rest, and recommended hospital care. After some pleading he agreed that I could be cared for at one of my children's place. After an assessment by the Silver-Chain sister however, we had to come to the conclusion that facilities at home were not

adequate enough for the care of the elderly person with a fractured pelvis.

And so I became a patient at Fair-Haven. I received a very warm welcome and was given a brand new private, sunny room. Some furniture was brought into the room to make it homely and my daughter also brought some of my own pictures to hang up on the wall. The room soon looked lovely and cozy. I honesty felt as though I was in a 5-star hotel.

The staff were fantastic. Mr and Mrs Pitlo are very dedicated carers of Fair-Haven Hostel. There is also one

qualified nurse who gives strict orders. Then there are other nursing staff members who do their work with great love and

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care. The kitchen staff made delicious meals and in a course of three weeks every meal was different.

What also made my stay there so nice was that I was surrounded by my own brothers and sisters of the communion of saints. Every evening we sang psalms and hymns. This really made me feel at home. If you ever need to be nursed at a hospital, consider Fair-Haven as a first option.





WHAT WE DO

hroughout the week visitors rotate their services to the residents. Currently, there is a "visitors scheme roster" in place, to prevent all visitors coming on one day, and nil visitors for the rest of the week. Regular activities from the visitors includes making cards, coasters, and pictures for possible sale at fundraising stalls. Visitors are always welcome, and they usually play games, chat about current affairs, join in heartily in a sing-a-long, or take residents for walks. All these activities are much appreciated by the residents, who would like these activities to continue. So, if you have some spare time during the week, please come along and join in!!

OUR CARERS

responsible team of experienced and skilled staff provide twenty four hour care of the residents. The Housemother, G Pitlo, coordinates staff and resident activity and provides leadership in ensuring that residents enjoy high standards of care in a therapeutic environment. She is also responsible for staff development, as well as organising visits by the hairdresser, who comes every 6 weeks to the Hostel; the podiatrist who visits every second month; dietitians, and any other service required







by the residents.

The Housemother is assisted by the second-incharge, S van de Esschert, who has also given Fair Haven years of dedicated service. The hostel also has its own registered nurse, M Janssen, whose professional standard is vital in the administration of medications, providing acute care, and in assessing and developing care plans for each of the residents. The R.N. also consults regularly with the

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allied health care team, such as doctors, physiotherapists, hospital departments as required, and the community palliative care team. In addition to

her regular shifts, the R.N. is also on twenty-four hour call, seven days a week.

Mr A van Leeuwen is voluntarily involved, and very busy, working with the Administrator, R.N. and Board members to secure accreditation for the hostel by the year 2001. This is a demanding task and requires meticulous documentation of all aspects related to the running of the

hostel. The Administrator, A Pitlo, is also responsible for the financial running of the hostel. This is a complicated task made up of facts and figures and lots of wishful thinking.





oists are a regular feature of hostel mechanics. Hoists are used to assist in the transfer of some of our residents. The hostel currently has two hoists; namely the battery-operated standing hoist, and the hydraulic Oxford Hoist. The hostel is hoping to purchase a battery-operated Oxford hoist as soon as the funds are available, as the hydraulic hoist is showing its years.

Hospital beds are essential for proper care of residents, particularly for those who require frequent re-positioning or spend a fair amount of time in bed. Hospital beds have the ability to be raised or lowered, and the head-ends of the bed can be elevated. At present, the Hostel has 7 hospital beds, and more will hopefully be purchased in the coming year. Specialised mattresses are very effective in preventing pressure sores, and for

increased comfort for the residents. Currently the hostel only has access to two spenco mattresses, and would dearly love to

purchase more. However, funds for this are limited. Wheelchairs are frequently utilised for transferring residents with walking difficulties, or for long distances. Currently the hostel has access to 2 wheelchairs which are used frequently. Residents health status' do fluctuate, and it appears that more will be required further down the track.
